Building a New Life in Australia Summary of Wave 6 changes

Survey content

- The Youth Module was introduced.
- Household demographic information for other people in the household was asked within the questionnaire and was asked of every respondent.
- Respondents were asked for consent to link their survey data with the Medicare Benefits Schedule,
 Pharmaceutical Benefits Schedule and Centrelink Welfare administrative datasets.

Data collection

Introduction of the Computer-Assisted Web Interview.

Dataset

- Participant types are no longer being used (e.g. PR, SR or SA). Everyone was considered a respondent and all
 respondents completed the same questionnaire.
- Additional categories have been added to the household structure derive to account for new scenarios.
- New variable fcountnorel provides a count of the number of times a respondent used a negative code (-1 does not apply, -2 don't know, -3 prefer not to say) to respond to the 'relationship to respondent' question when reporting on other people in the household. This variable should be used in conjunction with the household structure derive.
- Introduction of xhh_id indicator variable, which links together respondents in the same household.
- The introduction of the web interview meant that respondents could drop out part way through the survey. Respondents that completed at least the first 2 modules were included on the released dataset.
- Data will only be released in a wide file format.
